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LATE WORK AND RETESTS

- Late work will be accepted for summative and formative assessments within each 6-week grading period. (ex. Missing work from the first 6-week grading period will **not** be accepted during the second or third 6-week grading period.)
- Each day the work is late will count off a letter grade. (ex. Student A turns in summative assessment 3 days after original due date. The student receives a 70% if everything else on the paper is 100% correct. Avoid this by doing the work on time!)
- Students may re-assess common assessments within 10 days of the graded work, provided he/she assessed prior. Students may be asked to complete additional work prior to re-assessing to ensure the re-assessment score is an improved one.
